JUDAISM WITH A HUMANISTIC PERSPECTIVE

Rabbi's Message

Beth Adam is a meaningful voice. I know this because I experience it on a daily basis, and I know it because it's our vision statement: Congregation Beth Adam is a spiritual home, a meaningful voice, and a humanistic resource for people worldwide, seeking a contemporary Jewish identity and experience.

We are a meaningful voice, and we increasingly have opportunities to share our voice around the country, not only online but at conferences from Vegas to Kansas to Chicago to New York. Last March Rabbi Barr and I traveled to Tribefest, a Jewish Federation event designed to attract Jews between the ages of 22 and 45. We led two sessions: one on Judaism and technology — and one on what it means to be Jewish in the 21st century. Assuming that cyberJudaism is a hot topic, we expected that session to be much larger. But we were surprised. It turned out that the session on Judaism for the 21st century was one of the most

popular sessions at the conference.

We spoke about demographic trends in general — and particularly in the Jewish community. Outlining many of the ways in which society is evolving, we then talked about how Judaism too must actively evolve to remain significant. We talked at length about Congregation Beth Adam and its unique philosophy and values. Many participants were surprised to hear rabbis say things that they had never heard rabbis say before. Many saw Judaism in a new and compelling way. They discussed what being Jewish meant to each of them — and we could hear in many of their comments a new sense of empowerment that they felt after hearing Beth Adam's voice.

In December I was invited to speak at the Union for Reform Judaism's (URJ) Biennial Conference. Incidentally President Obama also spoke at this conference, but unfortunately we did not have the opportunity to finish each other's sentences as I had hoped.

Being invited by the URJ was quite a triumph (yes, when they invited me they knew they were calling Beth Adam and knew our history!). As some of you know, in the 1990s Beth Adam applied to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (which is now the URJ). Our application for membership challenged the Reform Movement in new ways and was ultimately not accepted. Thus we moved forward as an independent congregation – one that is vibrant, bold, and intentional. Since that time, our voice has only strengthened.

I spoke to the URJ Biennial guests about Beth Adam and OurJewishCommunity.org and their achievements. People outside Cincinnati are usually amazed by how different Beth Adam is from other congregations and how much we have accomplished. They are intrigued by our voice, which is not only meaningful, but also different from what they are used to hearing. I find more and more that people say things like “your congregation represents exactly how I feel about Judaism, I just never knew there was a congregation like that.” Well there is, and we at Beth Adam should all be very proud of what our congregation represents.

When Rabbi Barr and I speak at conferences like these, I see that our voices resonate with many Jews. But I also know the voice is not just mine or just Rabbi Barr’s. Rather our voices represent every member of this community. Of course, it’s not that

we all agree on everything, but we do have shared core values. The beauty of Beth Adam is that the meaningful voice and values get played out in lots of ways big and small and that together our voice grows not only within our walls but beyond. When we share Beth Adam’s vision with others, it not only enriches their understanding of Judaism but also positions us as a major Jewish institution. It should bring excitement and energy to us here in Cincinnati to know that Beth Adam members are paving the way for a bright Jewish future and that people around the world are noticing.

We also understand that people’s lives are increasingly transient and that we ourselves and the students educated in our Religious School may not remain in Cincinnati. Since Beth Adam’s inception there has been a commitment to helping create a Jewish environment that those who are raised here can experience elsewhere. Creating an online congregation, accepting opportunities to speak around the country, sharing our voice through podcasts, engaging in programs with rabbis around the country – these create a more open and diverse Judaism in other communities. While it will be impossible to recreate other Beth Adams around the country – we can work to create a more open Jewish world in which diversity of religious philosophy and thought is respected. We also want rabbis and communities around the globe to see us as a resource when they get requests for more welcoming,

theologically diverse, and non-traditional services. Our voice must not remain in Cincinnati alone, but rather continue to be part of a larger chorus that spans the world.

Others in the Jewish community are observing us, often admiring us, and waiting to see what we do next. I'm also excited about what our meaningful voice will continue to represent.

Community Connection

Rabbi Barr gave the Christmas Eve 2007 sermon at First Unitarian Church of Cincinnati. That sermon, which can be found online, was discovered by a theatre company, Horizon, in Norristown, PA. The director of a new Christmas production contacted Rabbi Barr and asked if the closing of his sermon could be used in a production called "Voices of Christmas" a holiday show made up of songs, stories, and readings. Rabbi Barr agreed and went to see one of the many performances of this warm and witty production. Sitting in a theatre hearing his words spoken by others, was, Rabbi Barr reports, a wonderful and strange experience.

Rabbi Barr participated in the Zion Baptist Church's annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day observance. He has been participating in their service for the last several years representing Congregation Beth Adam and the

Cincinnati Jewish Community.

Rabbi Barr will be a guest speaker at Cedar Village. He is part of the "Thursday with the Rabbis" Program. He will talk about and answer questions about a contemporary approach to Judaism.

Rabbi Barr will be flying to Chicago, IL, to speak at Limmud Chicago, a community wide day of Jewish education. He will be speaking on Judaism for the 21st Century.

Rabbi Barr will be attending the 3rd Rabbis Without Borders Seminar in New York City. The program brings rabbis together from around the country and across the ideological spectrum.

Rabbi Barr will be traveling down to Louisville, KY to present his lecture The Creation Museum – Exposed. This presentation examines the underlying philosophy and goal of this nationally known institution.

Beth Adam, OurJewishCommunity.org, and the Center for Holocaust and Humanity Education co-hosted an event at Beth Adam on January 27th for the UN Day of Holocaust Commemoration. This event featured panelists from Xavier and the University of Cincinnati speaking about bystanders and was streamed to an audience around the world via OurJewishCommunity.org.
