Rabbi's Message

The 2016 Presidential election is long over, but the ramifications are not. Many consider this campaign to be one of the most brutal and divisive in recent memory. During the campaign, strains of racism, misogyny, anti-semitism, Islamophobia, and more were exposed and even heightened. And while we may believe that "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice" as Martin Luther King, Jr. said, the arc is not necessarily smooth or always moving forward. There are bumps and setbacks. Achievements gained can be lost. While we may want to believe that once a battle is won, it is won forever, we must realize it is not. Eliminating mistrust, hatred, racism, and more is an ongoing process. Our work is not done.

While there will be many debates about this election, how a newcomer to politics bested a field of 16 seasoned Republican candidates and toppled the Democratic

nominee who was thought to be a shoo-in, I ask what do we do now? Now that fractures in our society have been exposed and hate speech appears to be on the rise, what do we do now? It strikes me that simply blaming the election process or even one campaign is not a plan for success. There is work to be done and it's all hands on deck.

To be clear, I am not talking Republican or Democrat. I am talking about the values that underpin our democracy. Reasonable people may disagree about economic policies or the best way to protect our nation. But our nation has stood for something to its citizens and to those around the world. There is a vision of a more perfect union in which all citizens can live their lives free from fear or discrimination.

I am not naive. I know that there have been problems and that our nation has not lived up to its ideals. I know that there are some in our nation who do not believe that all people should be treated

fairly or be fully included. I know that there are those who spew words of hatred and prejudice. And while we may have hoped that those who harbor prejudice were disappearing, we are faced with the reality that now many seem invigorated. They believe that they can spew their hatred without consequence. It is incumbent on us to prove them wrong.

Now is not the time to turn a blind eye to prejudice nor throw up our hands in frustration. Though I do understand being frustrated, and I realize that people are tired of confronting problems once thought solved. But the responsibility to build a healthy society does not rest upon others, it rests upon us. There is no single solution to such a complex problem. No one size fits all. Thus, each of us needs to decide for ourselves how we will be involved. How will we make a difference in the arenas that we function in? What organizations will we support? What will we demand of our elected officials? What will we demand of ourselves? As a congregation we have a responsibility too, in the way we educate our students, in the programs we get involved in, and the community that we create here at Beth Adam. And while there is work to be done there is still time to celebrate and laugh together as a congregation.

While social media and modern technology provide an effective platform for people to spew hatred and false accusations, thus making the work to combat prejudice more difficult, it is not

insurmountable. King was not wrong when he said "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." He was not sure how long this would take, nor am I. Together, supporting one another, leaning upon one another when we are weary, we can make a difference.

At Beth Adam we believe that the core to our theological philosophy is that external forces do not solve the problems of our world. If we truly believe this we must act. We must work to create a better nation for those here today and for those who will live here in years to come.

"Lesbians in Recent American History"

Sequoia Powers-Griffin is a Cincinnati lesbian who was active in the second wave of feminism in the 1970s and 1980s. In this two-part presentation, she explores a century of lesbian experience in the United States from the early 20th century right up to the 2015 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that the Constitution guarantees same gender couples the right to marry. What happened to transform a totally taboo lifestyle into a Supreme Court accepted marriage choice? This series explores answers to the question beginning with (**Part 1, January 8**) actual life stories of lesbians from the first half of the twentieth century up to (**Part 2, January 15**) the presenter's own story and participation in historical events.

At Beth Adam we value community engagement and social justice that is responsive to the ever-changing world. We are committed to Tzedakah* and the Jewish tradition of social action. A remarkable number of our members take active roles in our social action projects.

Several times a year, members of Beth Adam prepare a lunch and staff a soup kitchen. Also, we collect food for the Loveland Inter Faith Effort (L.I.F.E.) – a local food pantry that depends on our contributions to provide services to local families in need. This effort is led by our Teens during the High Holidays. In December Beth Adam members donated over 225 pairs of new socks in all sizes for Loveland families in need.

Throughout the year our Religious School students donate money for and learn about many charities as a way of learning Tzedakah. They also volunteer their time with community organizations. Twice a year, our older Sunday school students serve lunch and lead a craft project at the Episcopal Church of Our Saviour in Mt. Auburn, providing a much needed meal and community.

Hillel says, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am only for myself, who am I?" During Hanukkah this year families made commitments to themselves of ways they can "light the

world" in the New Year. Do your New Year plans include Tzedakah or giving of your time to community?

There are many ways to be involved in your community. One way is here at Beth Adam. We need volunteers for one-time tasks or projects and for on-going roles throughout the year. There are opportunities open to teach in the religious school next year and committee work openings.
