Rabbi's Message

I need your help. In September of 2014 during the Evening Rosh Hashanah Service, we lit Beth Adam's Eternal Light by solar power. While doing so didn't significantly change Beth Adam's energy use or carbon foot print, it was my hope that it would be a powerful statement about our commitment to the environment. Given that almost every element of Beth Adam's sanctuary reflects our congregational philosophy, making a "front and center" statement about the environment was important.

In 2001 when we first lit the Eternal Light it was not solar powered, it was plugged in just like any other lamp. With each passing year since then, it has become overwhelmingly clear that our planet's environment is under stress. Global climate change is wreaking havoc across the world and it only seems to be getting worse. It is an issue that can't be ignored. I believe that the philosophy of Beth Adam requires us to take responsibility for our planet. As we state in our brochures and web site, at the core of our theological philosophy is the belief that external forces do not solve the problems of our world. We alone are responsible for our actions, and we each bear responsibility for repairing our world.

When the solar panel was installed to power the Eternal Light, I decided to place it near the front of the building

so that it could be seen. I hoped that people would see the solar panel and wonder about it so the panel would encourage conversation and action. It was also my intention to have a plaque in front of the panel with a short statement about Beth Adam's philosophy and responsibility to protect our earth. If you've looked at the solar panel you saw NO plaque. I couldn't find the words that briefly captured all I thought was necessary to say. Thus, the plaque was never created.

So that is why I need your help. I'd like anyone to send me their thoughts on what should be said on the solar panel that stands outside of Beth Adam. What you create needs to be short enough (15-20 words) to be engraved on a metal plaque that will be outside. It should succinctly and accurately reflect Beth Adam's philosophy and values. This isn't a competition with only one idea being selected. Rather, I'm looking for ideas and assistance. And like much of what is created at Beth Adam, it will be a collaboration of many people working together. In order to move this project along, please send me your ideas by April 30th. The goal is to finalize the wording and have the plaque installed before the High Holidays 2017. I want to incorporate environmentalism into the Rosh Hashanah Children's Service in 2017 and having that plaque would be part of that experience.

1. In order to qualify to be on the wall either the donor or the person being recognized/remembered must be a member of Beth Adam.
2. Each inscription donation will cost \$540.00 and is separate from other donations to the Congregation.
3. Engraving begins once full payment is made.
4. Inscriptions are a total of 100 letters, numbers, and spaces in each dedication space, including the donor's name. English only.
5. Each inscription will be randomly placed in the interest of fairness and spacing.
6. One standardized font has been selected for all inscriptions.
7. Upper and lowercase letters in sentence structure only.
8. There are only a limited number of spaces to be engraved.
9. Beth Adam reserves the right not to accept an inscription if it is thought to be inappropriate for the REFLECTIONS WALL.
10. A request to shorten the inscription may be required due to spacing limitations, and the donor will be consulted prior to engraving.
